A member of the Calgary team, was a Reservist in HMCS Tecumseh in Calgary in the 1980s. Besides doing CSVS research he is an active volunteer with the Calgary Field of Crosses. This year he helped install over 3600 crosses including those of 55 CSVS sailors from the Calgary area.

He is working with the Ken McPherson photographic archives housed in the Naval Museum of Alberta (University of Calgary). He is helping scan pictures of the over 400 Canadian warships that CSVC sailors served in.

Ross joined the UNTD in 1960 at HMCS *Star.* He transferred to HMCS *Donnacona* and retired in 1975. He has researched the story of one sailor from his hometown of Oakville and keeps the administrative machinery running.

Ted Davie, OMM, CD, Capt (N) RCN (Ret'd) - Chercheur

Now living in Kingston, Ted was born in Alberta. He started naval career at RMC and put in a full 38-years with the RCN, in both submarines and surface warships. He has now been retired for 27 years. He spends his time volunteering with CACOR, his church and RMC, and enjoys kayaking. Ted volunteered for CSVC because he believes our sailors deserve proper recognition.

Jocelyn (Jody) Doll, SLt RCNR (Ret'd) - Éditeur

Jody was born in Edmonton and grew up in Vancouver. She joined the military in 1975 as a medical assistant and attained the rank of Leading Wren before deciding to become a Registered Nurse (RN). In 1979 she took a leave of absence from HMCS Discovery and started RN training at the University of Alberta Hospital School of Nursing. She rejoined HMCS Discovery in 1981 as a Sub-Lieutenant, remaining on staff as a Nursing Officer until 1986.

In 1990 Jody was seriously injured in an argument with a horse.

In 1998 she was appointed to the British Columbia Coroner Service becoming the first female Coroner in the logging town of Squamish. Jody active in the NOABC and a highly valued member of Bob White's team.

Julie is an author and freelance writer/photographer. While serving as an administration officer in HMCS Discovery, the Naval Reserve unit in Vancouver, BC for fourteen years, she researched and wrote *Through a Canadian Periscope: The Story of the Canadian Submarine Service*. Dundurn published it in two editions, one in 1996 and the second in 2014 for the centenary of the RCN Submarine Force. She also published *Deeply Canadian: New Submarines for a New Millennium* in two editions when the Victoria class followed the Oberons into service. Dundurn published two more of her books on church history and the fur trade in 2006 and 2009.

Ferguson also exhibits and sells her images. Since 1971 she has had hundreds of articles and her images published in print and online, as well as six short books for writers and teachers.

Why the CSVC project? Kim served in four Naval Reserve Divisions over her career: Donnacona, Griffon, Carleton and York. "I found it frustrating that we could recite the names of the ships lost in the Battle of the Atlantic, but our NRDs (at least the ones I served in) did not have a good memory of the men who crewed those ships. In retirement, I did a little research for a Dutch project called Faces to Graves (https://www.facestograves.nl/). The process and the format of the stories brought those men to life so that a new generation could learn about their sacrifice. The Faces to Graves team gave me permission to use their format for this project and the UNTDA enthusiastically agreed to support the project. Now, wonderful Canadians have volunteered to bring the RCNVR, RCNR and WRCNS war dead back to life so that they can be commemorated as we celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Naval Reserve in 2023."

Louise Leblanc-Mazur - Chercheuse et Traducteur

Louise Leblanc Mazur is a retired professional translator, teacher, and principal from Vankleek Hill, Ontario. now living in North Glengarry, Ontario. In retirement, Louise started doing family genealogy. Through this endeavour she has discovered that some family members served in the military during past conflicts and was interested in doing further research.

Joining the CSVC project as a researcher and translator allowed her to discover many sailors from her area who served and needed to be brought to the forefront so the new generation can know and remember them. It is important to "bring them home". To her this is a great way to get involved and recognize the sacrifice these young men made for our future.

Roger Litwiller - Chercheur

Roger is a historian, researcher and lecturer on Canada's naval and maritime heritage, giving talks from St. John's, NF to Esquimalt, BC.

Roger served in the Canadian Armed Forces Reserve, working with cadets and his civilian career was a Paramedic for 37 years, where he was awarded the Exemplary Service Medal and Bar, Ontario Award for Paramedic Bravery and the Long Service Medal. Following his retirement from Paramedicine, the Canadian Coast Guard employed Roger under contract as their historian from 2019 to 2020. As an author, Roger has several books published and has written for many journals, periodicals, newspapers and webpages. Roger's research has contributed to documentaries and several Canadian and International museums, providing information for exhibits and repatriating recovered historical artifacts. Greg is a retired teacher/principal/director of education. He's a bit of an amateur history buff, especially local history. The teacher in him, seems to compel telling others of what he's learned. The CSVC project provides a wonderful opportunity to learn of the 55 sailors from the Calgary area who joined the Navy but sadly, never returned. We have a Calgary team of 9 so far, who are researchers or photo scanners, Memorial Plaque builders, or country road cenotaph searchers. It's been sad work but very satisfying to tell the compelling stories of those who until now, have been largely just names on a memorial. We will mount a Memorial Plaque at the Naval Museum of Alberta. It will feature both the Calgary, and Edmonton sailors. It will be complemented by the detailed stories prepared by our team.

David Mitchell. LS RCNR (Ret'd) - Chercheur

A member of the Calgary team, David was a Reservist in HMCS Tecumseh in Calgary in the late 1960s and 70s. Besides doing CSVS research David is an active Birder and leads field trips in the Calgary region.

Patrick Nichol, LS RCNR (Ret'd) - Chercheur

A member of the Calgary team, Pat - was an Reservist in HMCS Tecumseh in Calgary in the 1980s. He was a newspaper reporter for 16 years and a bookseller for 24 years. His interest in the project arose from his "Watchkeeper" service at the Naval Museum of Alberta.

He feels it is important that the citizen sailors of Canada who lost their lives should be memorialized in a more detailed manner than simply being a name on a plaque or memorial. The CSVC project serves to achieve that aim.

Robert W. White, LCdr RCNR (Ret'd) - Chercheur

The indefatigable Bob's work has two tracks: he has assumed responsibility for 50 of our sailors' stories, as well as a project to rejuvenate HMCS Discovery's Honour Roll (add link) and the stories of its sailors too. Most of the sailors are included in both projects, but they have to be dealt with separately as the requirements are different. Recognizing the size of this job, Bob has managed to recruit several assistants.

Bob joined the UNTD in HMCS Discovery in the fall of 1960 and long after retirement from the Naval Reserve, has remained active with Discovery (1989) and the Naval Association of BC in a variety of capacities. For many years he has edited the NACBC's newsletter, the Dog Watch. Bob authored a terrific booklet on the 75th anniversary UNTD reunion in St. John's NL and the subsequent tour of the island.

Rudi Wycliffe - Chercheur

McMaster University and HMCS Star ('67) (the last UNTD year). Pursued naval training throughout university and briefly thereafter, retiring from reserve service 1972 and married Kathryn (met during reserve duties at Star). Batchelor of Engineering (Civil); a career with the Province of Ontario, retiring 2000. Friendship with Greg McKenzie (Tecumseh, Calgary) since 1968 led to hearing about this project. Researching these young, young men has been a moving experience and an honour. Brief lives and brief service cut short by tragedy, making the ultimate sacrifice for their country and freedom. I have even had the chance of meeting a relative of one of these heroes. The amount of information varies from sailor to sailor but one gets to know these men through this research.
